

# HOMEOWNER **SAFETY**

#### **Homeowner Basics**

- 1. Make sure smoke alarms are operable.
- 2. Know where your water shut-off valve is and ensure it is operable.
- 3. Know how to shut off water flow to the hot water heater.
- 4. Know where to shut off the gas.
- 5. Know where your electrical panel is and how to shut it off.

- Is your kitchen a danger zone for children knives, heat, and heavy objects?

#### Pets

- Where will you take your pet in an emergency?
- Is there someone to care for your pet if you're unavailable?





# **Securing Against Burglary**

## Simple Security Tips

Doors – Make sure you have strong doors. Even the most efficient lock, if it is placed in a weak door, will not keep out a determined burglar. A peephole or a wideOangle viewer in the door is safer for identifying visitors than a door chain.

Locks – Deadbolt locks are best. They usually are locked with a key from the outside and a thumb turn on the inside. The cylinder (where the key is inserted) should be pick-resistant.

Windows – Key locks are available for all types of windows. For windows at street level or on fire escapes, consider installing metal accordion gates.

### **Vacation Tips**

- Tell dependable neighbors when you plan to be away and join with your neighbors to keep a close watch on what's happening in your area.
- Have mail picked up, forwarded or held by the post office.
- Stop newspaper deliveries.
- Lower phone ringer so it can't be heard from outside.
- Leave blinds open to their usual position.
- Arrange to have your lawn mowed.
- Ask a friend or neighbor to hold your deliveries.
- Use automatic timers to turn lights on and off in various parts of the home at appropriate times.

#### **Correct Weakness**

- "Case" your house or apartment just as a burglar would.
- High fences and shrubbery can add to privacy, but can also be an asset to a burglar.
- Exterior lights and motion detectors can reduce the darkness.
- Simple security devices nails, screws, padlocks, door/window locks, grate bars & bolts – can increase time it takes to break into your home.
- Invest in a burglar alarm. The most effective ones also ring an outside service.
- Re-arrange furnishings so valuables are not visible from outside.

# **Home Security Habits**

- Establish a routine to lock doors/windows and turn on alarm systems.
- Avoid giving information to unidentified telephone callers and announcing your personal plans online or in public notices.
- Notify the police if you see suspicious strangers in your area.
- Don't carry house keys on a key ring with your home address; Also, don't leave keys with your car in a commercial parking lot or with an attendant.
- Don't hide keys in "secret" places outside your home burglars usually know where to look.
